I look forward to annual newsletters from friends and family full of photos of growing children and their joys and challenges of the preceding year.

I am pleased to present our annual report for our 2023 fiscal year. Behind every graph and data point in this newsletter, there are stories of our neighbors and our partners, volunteers and staff, food donors, and financial donors gathering good food and goodwill on behalf of our Washtenaw County community.

## Sadly, there are many stories of great hardship fueled by the high cost of food and essentials.

While inflation rose at a slower pace in 2023, the price of basic needs like groceries and housing are still at historic levels. It will likely be many more months, if not years, for many to regain financial stability.

**The same pressures impacting our neighbors also strained our operating budget.** Facing a decline in federal food resources, Food Gatherers purchased 40% more pounds of food in FY2023 to ensure our neighbors continue to have access to nutritious food. **There are joyful stories, as well.** Active Faith Community Services, one of our pantry partners, recently shared this testament to our collective work:

A young mother of two who struggled with deep depression during the challenging times of Covid has transformed her life with the support of our food pantry. Overcoming the difficulty of even leaving her bed, she now shines as a college student at Washtenaw Community College, getting all A's. She's on a remarkable path to becoming an outstanding social worker, turning adversity into triumph. We are so proud of her.

**Resilience, determination, compassion...** Our neighbors facing food insecurity and our nonprofit partners continually overcome obstacles and challenges to create a brighter future for everyone. Together, we write a story of hope.



# **Food Gatherers Annual Report** Fiscal Year 2023: July 1, 2022 – June 30, 2023

**T**o meet the incredible need for food L assistance in Washtenaw County in fiscal year 2023, Food Gatherers provided the equivalent of 18,000 meals per day through our network of more than 140 hunger-relief agencies and programs. Together, we helped individuals and families access food at schools, clinics, affordable housing sites, shelters, social service agencies, and many more.







The equivalent of 6.5 million meals

relied on our network last year during continued inflation Land a significant reduction in SNAP benefits. Counting every person in every household, each time they received services, Food Gatherers and our network helped 1,021,652 people access the healthy food they need. We assisted 500+ callers, distributed 13,500+ flyers in six languages, and received 35,000+ views on our Find Food webpage.

## **Our Programs**

Food Gatherers Community Kitchen prepared and served 58,060 plates of food.

The Healthy School Pantry Program (2022-2023) partnered with 15 schools to connect 1,500+ families per month to produce and groceries.

The Summer Food Service Program (2022) hosted 24 sites to ensure 1.216 children could access healthy meals when school was out.

Neighborhood Grocery Initiatives provided 679.648 pounds of food to residents at 24 low-income housing sites.





## **Equity in Action**



Systemic inequities impact economic opportunity, health, and hunger in Washtenaw County. To help address these root causes, Food Gatherers completed an Equity Self-Assessment in 2023.

Participants from every department evaluated practices and policies in

a variety of areas including community collaboration and workforce composition and culture. Based on these discussions, we identified three areas to focus on incorporating more equitable practices in the next year: improving guest experience, volunteer outreach, and staff recruitment.

We are grateful to staff for sharing their diverse insights and experiences and are excited by the work ahead of us!

## **Advocacy Corner**



In December, Food Gatherers supported two neighbor-led listening sessions with community members who have lived experience with food insecurity. The conversations looked closely

at hunger in Washtenaw County and the importance of federal nutrition programs like SNAP.

These federal nutrition programs serve as the first line of defense against hunger and are one of the main focus areas in the Farm Bill, which is up for reauthorization in Congress.

We will be sharing the insights from the listening sessions with Senator Debbie Stabenow to help shape a Farm Bill that addresses the needs of our community. We are also summarizing feedback from neighbors about their food pantry experiences that we'll be sharing with our hunger-relief partners locally to help inform best practices.
